Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative (CAI)



Fuel Zone Re-Launch

RE Verbal Feedback

Here are some of the main points and high level feedback from the HMIe visit with the Faculty of Religious Education on 5th February 2013:

Learners in All Saints liked Religious Education because it was interactive, involved discussion and research and they found it challenging. They appreciated learning about all world faiths and found that they retained knowledge about the subject because they were actively involved and there were many links to real life. Learners demonstrated a mature attitude towards the charitable work and Faith in Action programmes they were involved in. Experiences such as being part of the soup kitchen in town or visiting the young mothers unit at Smithycroft helped them with having a more rounded view of life and to be less judgemental in their attitude. Religious education experience had supported them to be nicer people, work better as part of a team, feel more part of the local community and be better equipped to make moral decisions.

Learners also reflected that RE helps to improve literacy skills and vocabulary as well as having close links with History.

Learners understand the value of putting faith into action and take part in a very impressive list of events and activities.

Our partners felt they were appreciated in their role with All Saints and our associated priests were very happy with our involvement in the celebration of mass and retreats in their parishes.

There is a sense of a really strong ethos and the school is welcoming, open and friendly. The inspectors noted several conversations and actions of learners and staff which highlighted this.

A key message for us was that Faith is a lived experience in our school.

- Evident in enthusiastic and engaging young people.
- Strong pastoral care for staff as well as learners.
- The quality of relationships among young people and staff.
- Well structured programmes such as the CARITAS award, Faith in Action, programmes of work in RE reflecting this is our Faith.

Teaching and learning was observed and good practice was reflected in: the focus on literacy and higher order thinking skills, learning intentions leading to well structured lessons and weekly homework adding to the experience and giving RE credibility.


In summary: the staff in All Saints have taken "This is our Faith" and made it a reality through Faith in Action.

The audience for the event included Sadie Docherty – Lord Provost, Nicola Sturgeon – Deputy First Minister, Cllr Gordon Matheson – Leader of the Council, various Bailies and Councillors, religious leaders from across faith groups and members of the Jewish community and other communities who were targeted in the Holocaust.

Jenna was incredibly respectful and well aware of the sensitivities which surrounded the occasion. She was confident and articulate and clearly had prepared well for the event showing an understanding of the Holocaust and its impact on the various communities. All Saints Film Productions - "The Olivia Show"

Following the success of their previous films, For Our Tomor-row'and Daydreaming," ASF Productions are delighted to announce that their latest offering, The Olivia Show," scooped no less than four awards at the latest Determined To Make Mov-

ies Awards Ceremony. The film won Best Business Partnership; Best Actress for Billy Scott in S2; Best Actor for David McMahon in S6 and Highly Commended in the Best Drama category.

The Determined To Make Movies competition is a Glasgow City Council initiative to encourage film making and creativity in Glasgow Schools. The competition is open to all the schools in Glasgow and is run twice yearly. There were 26 films made for this competition, which had the overall theme of "Safety", with schools selecting a particular area (water safety, road safety, fire safety, personal safety, rail safety, cyber safety, etc.).

The Olivia Show'explored the issues of cyber safety and personal safety and saw the central character, Olivia (played by Billy Scott), giving her friends good advice about their safety, but forgetting all of this in relation to herself when the potential threat came in a different way - a "once in a lifetime opportunity" of an audition for a "new show". This was the most controversial film that ASF Productions has made so far with no happy ending. The film was praised for the great acting and directing, the filming and editing and for being a really good tool for discussion about cyber and personal safety issues.

ASF Productions have really benefited from the huge amount of work that founder members Conor McMahon and Jack Patterson have put in to the projects. *The Olivia Show'* was scripted, filmed, directed and edited by Jack and Conor - so its success is largely down to them. Currently in S5, they are both hoping to move on to study Film and Television next year and we wish them both every success in the future.
